
Last week our educators attended the Shenton Network Day, engaging in professional learning (PL) sessions. As many saw through our Dojo posts, the day was very engaging, providing networking opportunities with our local schools. Sessions included information and practice in media training and communications, talk 4 Writing, Supporting Students with Special Needs in the Classroom, Incorporating Oral Language into Play-Based learning and many more. Attending PL events such as these provide us with opportunities to plan, learn and improve to continue to provide the best teaching and learning opportunities here at Hollywood.

The highlight of the Network Day was the keynote speaker Mr Clark Wight, Head of Guildford Grammar Preparatory School, who presented on the topic of "What is the resilience thing?". Clark gave insight into how instrumental failure is in learning resilience. During the week I called Clark and asked if I could share some of his tips which are highlighted in our Curriculum section below.

At Hollywood one of our key values is Resilience, although this is more of a skill than a value, it plays an instrumental role in forming a strong moral compass and a realistic view of the world. We are a future focused school, not only with our innovative teaching strategies and learning opportunities but with our deep understanding that learning and growing is challenging and everyone faces this differently, more importantly everyone requires their own individualised process for dealing with failure or disappointments.

The role of Hollywood Primary School in building resilience in our students is to ensure that they know they are exposed to difficulties but know they are not alone, they are part of our community that no matter what bumps and hurdles are in front of them we will always be here to support.

Staff Performance and Development

Throughout the year the HPS educators engage in professional learning linked to our HPS Business Plan and 2019 Focus to ensure our students have a creative and engaging learning opportunities. One of the areas we are engaging in through Term 2 and Term 3 will be peer observation using the GROWTH Coaching model. A key component we use is Coaching Partners. Each staff member chooses a Coaching Partner to work with to achieve the goal they set with their Performance Developer (Line Manager). Staff will use the GROWTH Coaching framework to have coaching conversations that keep each other accountable and tracking towards achieving their goal. The Coaching Partners will also have the opportunity to observe each other teach and give feedback on areas they are wanting to further develop.

8 tips for future proofing our children:

1. **Family values:** Most businesses we know and work with have a clearly articulated set of values. How many families have their values clearly articulated and written for all to see in their homes? If our children know, discuss, live by (and break – let's be real here) our family values then they have a strong base from which to approach life. Try this as a family. Get your daughters and sons to add their words and discuss what they mean and why they are important to them. Keep the list between 5-8 items so that they can remember them. This is a great reference for them with specific praise when they live these values out and also as a reference point for when they are letting themselves or others down.

2. Strengths: Our children get too many messages in life about what they can't do. Futureproofing our kids means acknowledging areas of growth (aka weaknesses) AND focusing on their strengths. There are excellent free online surveys (I use <http://www.viacharacter.org/> with all our students) that can be used from 8-years-old. Character strengths are the pillars they can rely on when things are tough. Take your child's top 5-8 strengths and have them tape them to a mirror. That visual reminder every day is a powerful tool for their development.

3. Character counts: Like strengths and values, character is what makes your child(ren) uniquely them. Be specific and tell them what their character 'is' – who they are when they are at their best. Too often our children grow into adults never understanding what a 'good' person is on the inside. They need someone in their life to tell them: "You've got what it takes to be a great man/woman because ..." Generations of men/women have not been told this and we can all see the impact of that gap in our society.

4. Failure: This is not easy for us as parents. We actually need them to be unhappy at times, struggle, deal with hardship, hurt, loss and rejection. We stand by their side and support and listen, but we have to let them try their solutions and see the positive or negative impact of that solution. I know, I know, mamma bear and poppa bear want to come roaring out of the cave and strike down in a violent way anyone who dares to ignore, hurt or demoralise our child. It is our parental instinct. In doing so we do not allow our kids to learn for their future, we just fix (not really) the issue or the problem.

5. Resiliency 101: Interestingly, did any of us ever hear the word resiliency growing up? I ask that question of groups often and not once does anyone over 20-years-old ever remember the word being used when we were kids. Why now? Older parents, less children, more pressure, an uncertain future. Yes, to all, but there is more. Our hyper vigilance in parenting is actually the main cause of this. Our children need space to roam, play, imagine and be themselves without constant parental interference, rules and oversight. They need a bit of risk, of adventure and of boredom to create something new. Why are our kids not resilient? Is it because of us?

6. Futureproofing our children is also about saying no: They need to hear 'no' often. Delayed gratification (even when they are complaining for hours) is a key to giving our kids the tools to understand that life is not a constant stream of yes and now.

7. Nature: Futureproofing our children means unplugging from the matrix. Games are designed to suck them in for hours and hours. They are fun, but we as parents need to be the ones who teach them balance. Nature provides our greatest tools for the healthy development of our children. Weekends of unplugging, school holidays unplugged, week days unplugged. Whatever works for your family will benefit your family for the present and the future.

8. Love yourself: This is the most important one for your family. They need to see that we love ourselves. Despite our faults, wrinkles, failures, etc. we love who we are. We take time for us. We value our work, play, time and family. We need our kids to truly see that we can be authentic, vulnerable, loving and compassionate despite all our mistakes and our past. That will futureproof them to truly love themselves (not like an egocentric 15-year-old) when they are an adult. This can be the most challenging one for us as parents, but it is the most important. Love thyself!

Once children learn that creativity has no boundaries, and no right or wrong, they love having a go and letting their mind run wild.

For Terms 1 & 2, I have been running after-school art classes on a Monday for the senior students, and I have been blown away by some of the beautiful work that they have produced! Each of our projects ties in the elements of art with different techniques and mediums that can then be used in future school or at-home art projects. This term we have been consolidating warm and cool colours, and how these can be used with the elements of line and shape to create contrast. We have also been experimenting with sketching and how to use shading techniques to create depth. For the remainder of the term we will be looking into different textures and some techniques to create illusions of texture and form.

I am very much looking forward to running Junior Art Classes next term to see what the younger years create as well!

Their classroom is a combination of interactivity, intelligence and creativity, and they are eager to see what they will do in the upcoming weeks and terms.



Student Enrolments 2020

Community Nurse Update

Community Health Nurses work in schools to promote healthy development and wellbeing so students may reach their full potential. A major part of our work is focused on early intervention and the School Entry Health Assessment program.

Community Health Nurses serve as a health contact point for children and their families, providing information, assessment, health counselling and referral. The services provided are free and confidential.

Influenza

Influenza, or the 'flu' is caused by an influenza virus. It is spread through the air when someone coughs, sneezes or talks. It is also spread by touching something that has the virus on it and then touching your nose, eyes or mouth. Common symptoms include sore throat, cough, fever, headache, chills, tiredness and muscle aches.

People with the flu should rest and drink plenty of fluid. Use paracetamol in recommended doses if necessary - but do not give children any medication containing aspirin.

Be sure to keep your child home from school while he or she is sick.

The best way to prevent flu from spreading is by washing your hands regularly and after coughing, sneezing or blowing your nose. Flu vaccines are available prior to winter starting. For more information, contact your GP or local Immunisation Clinic.

Why should I consider having my child vaccinated against the flu?

The National Health and Medical Research Council, Australia's peak body for health advice, recommends annual vaccination for anyone six months of age or older who wants to reduce their chances of becoming ill with the flu.

Annual flu vaccination is strongly recommended for anyone six months of age or older with a medical condition that places them at higher risk of severe illness from flu. Children and adults with heart, lung or kidney disease or a weakened immune system, are eligible for free flu vaccine through the National Immunisation Program.

Children without underlying medical conditions who become infected with flu can also develop serious illnesses. Flu can cause high fever and pneumonia, and make existing medical conditions worse. Flu can also cause convulsions and diarrhoea in children.

Influenza viruses are always changing. Each year scientists try to match the strains of influenza viruses in the vaccine to those most likely to cause flu illnesses that year. It takes up to two weeks for protection to develop after vaccination against flu and protection lasts about a year.

The seasonal flu vaccine is available on prescription or via GP and immunisation clinics and is provided free for certain groups. Flu vaccines are available prior to winter starting. For more information visit healthywa.wa.gov.au/immunisation or contact your GP or Immunisation Clinic.
